

P-TECH: The pathway from classroom to career to a stronger economy

Sudhir and his colleagues in systems research at IBM hosted a group of eight interns during summer 2014.

P-TECH is a new type of school that begins in the 9th grade and educates students through grade 14, with a high school diploma and an associate in applied sciences (AAS) degree from New York City College of Technology. The school is a collaboration of IBM, the NYC Department of Education and the City University of New York. Students at P-TECH move at their own pace through high school and college alongside a unique workplace learning sequence, which prepares students for careers in the technology industry. P-TECH students work as interns once they have completed their third year of high school, three years of workplace learning and at least one college course. Some interns have just started college, while others have already earned up to 50 credits.

P-TECH internships are:

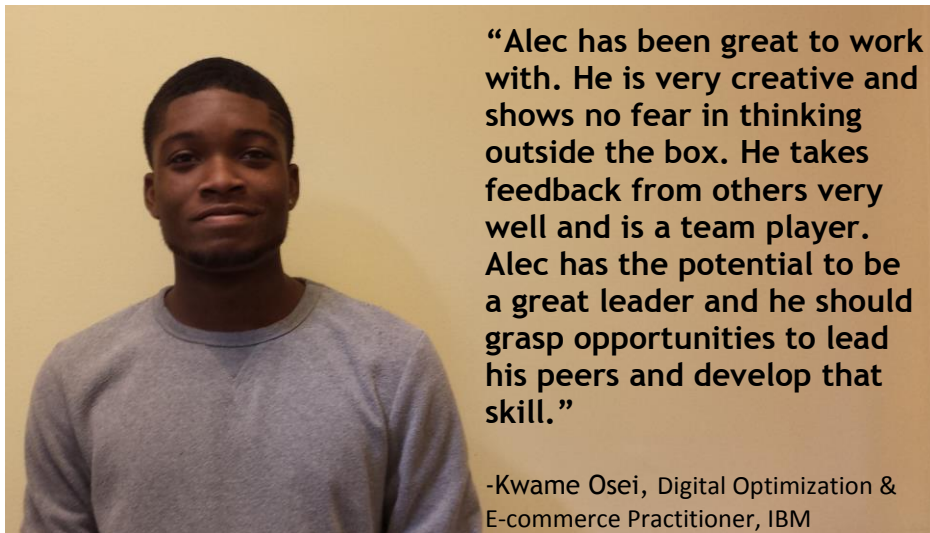
- 6-8 weeks, beginning late June and concluding mid-August
- Monday-Thursday, 9am- 5pm (max 32 hrs/wk)
- Skills-based and paid
- Based in New York City and accessible by public transportation

Who are the interns?

- Interns are working towards an AAS degree in Computer Information Systems or Electromechanical Engineering Technology
- Interns have completed three years of workplace learning courses, including Virtual Enterprise
- Interns are at least 16 years of age and have completed at least one college course

What is expected of P-TECH employers?

- Provide meaningful, paid work experiences that enable students to showcase their skills
- Provide supervision and mentorship for students
- Provide weekly feedback to school supervisor
